# From Dialogue to Action: Lessons from Sustainability Practitioners

**Kolkata, 13<sup>th</sup> May 2023:** Kolkata Center for Creativity (KCC) presented Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam V (VK V), a 2 –day conference over 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> May, which aimed to go beyond just dialogue and initiate practical engagement with the issues that our planet is currently facing. It continued the tradition of exploring what arts organizations like KCC can do to achieve shared goals and aspirations.

VK's fifth edition intended to provide a platform for diverse practitioners including researchers, artists, students and civil society to present their on-ground actions and experiments in local contexts. This had encouraged peer-to-peer learning and facilitate the exchange of ideas and knowledge systems. It is an opportunity to collectively share our expertise and experiences to foster a better future for all.

### Theme for VK V – 'From Dialogue to Action: Lessons from Sustainability Practitioners'

The fifth edition of Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam, was a conference that focused on sustainability and the United Nations' 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) for 2030. This year's conference, titled **'From Dialogue to Action: Lessons from Sustainability Practitioners,'** was held on **May 13th and 14<sup>th</sup>, 10 am to 7 pm** at the Kolkata Centre for Creativity. **The two-day event was also live-streamed on Zoom for participants who are located outside Kolkata**. The conference had been programmed and curated by Dr Gurudas Nulkar, Programmer Ms. Reena Dewan, Director KCCand Dr Shwetal A Patel co curator.

The UN has declared this decade the 'Decade of Ecosystem Restoration,' recognizing the urgent need to heal and restore the planet's ecosystems. This conference drew attention to the importance of sustaining ecosystems and the consequences of their degradation. It highlighted the need for collective learning and action to achieve an ecologically equitable planet.

The conference brought together sustainability practitioners to share their experiences and knowledge of understanding the inner workings of nature, how societies behave, and how



economies depend upon it. It emphasized the importance of deep understanding of local conditions, both physical, biological, and social, to achieve ecological restoration.

The conference also emphasized the role and importance of partnerships and cooperation across socio-economic groups to achieve the United Nations 2030 17 SDGs.
