KCC CELEBRATED THE GENIUS OF MYSTIC SUFI POET AMIR KHUSRAU WITH AN IMMERSIVE DASTANGOI



n World Music Day, Kolkata Centre for Creativity paid tribute to 13th-century Sufi poet, scholar and musician Amir Khusrau with an enchanting dastangoi titled 'Jo Dooba So Paar — A Mystical Musical Journey'. The GD Birla Sabhagar came alive with the traditional form of storytelling, and the audience joined in to remember and celebrate Khusrau and his Sufi mysticism. Produced by actor Manav Kaul, Jo Dooba So Paar is written and directed by Ajitesh Gupta, a classically trained singer and seasoned theatre actor from Mumbal. With over a decade of theatre experience, Ajitesh has worked with some of India's most acclaimed directors including Guizar, Atul Kumar, and Manav Kaul, and he led the production with his powerful voice and presence. Joining him was codirector Mohit Agarwal, a Sangeet Visharad and accomplished theatre artiste whose musical prowess and emotional depth added a resonant dimension to the show. With years of experience in the Mumbai theatre scene and collaborations with directors like Sunil Shanbag and Danish Hussah, Mohit brought both versatility and soul to this musical odyssey. With an ensemble cast of vocalists and musicians that included Mrummay Chavan, Rattan Deep Singh, Manasi Bhawalkar, Abhishek Srtvastava, Shalaka Redkar, Amita Ghugari, Sonakshi Singh, Ridved Singh, Snigdha Pious, Viraj Chavan and Ashish Mishra, the production was a feast for the eves, ears and the soul.

The the eyes, ear's and the south Jo Dooba So Paar's heads light on the human side of the Sufi poet, his deep and spiritual relationship with Nizamuddin Aulya, and the advent of Qawwall through their sacred bond. Dotted with interesting anecdotes and tales woven in a traditional daastaan, and accompanied by live Qawwall singing, the production offered a profound insight into the essence of Sufism and highlighted the eternally relevant message of love among humankind. Immortal compositions of Khusrau like *Chaap tilak* and *Aaj rang hat*, among others, and original compositions by Mohit Agarwal, who also served as music director of the show, sent the audience into a trance. The combined symphony of tabla, *dholak*, harmonium and tambourine added a very different flavour to *dastangol*. True to the *dastangol* tradition, the production had humour and wit, never once forgetting to provide depth to their respective roles. What made the experience worthwhile was the explanation that the artistes provided of profound Urdu poetry, making it an unforgettable evening.

The folks at the backstage deserve credit for adding drama and theatrical visual effects with an excellent play of lights on a simple stage setting. It only added in elevating the performance of the artistes on the stage.
