Introduction

Kolkata Centre for Creativity and Alliance Française du Bengale present the exhibition, "Kolkata to Dhaka, 1971: Marc Riboud's Lens on History," a tribute to one of the most celebrated photojournalists of the 20th century. This retrospective brings together a powerful collection of images that document the defining moments of Bangladesh's struggle for independence and the humanitarian crisis that unfolded in Kolkata and its surroundings. This will be the first time in India that an exhibition is entirely dedicated to Marc Riboud, reaffirming the significance of his work and its enduring legacy.

Marc Riboud, a legendary figure in photography, captured the resilience of refugees, the intensity of war, and the transition towards freedom. Through his lens, we see not just history but the human stories behind it. This exhibition offers a unique opportunity to rediscover these moments through the eyes of an artist who was committed to revealing the depth of human emotions in times of crisis.

Marc Riboud and Kolkata: A Deep Connection

Marc Riboud's ties with Kolkata date back to 1956, when he spent a year in India, immersing himself in the culture and artistic vibrancy of the city. He formed close connections, notably with the family of Krishna Roy, his sister-in-law, which allowed him a rare, intimate perspective on Kolkata.

His admiration for the city was shared by Satyajit Ray, who once said of Riboud:

"He is one of the rare photographers capable of capturing the very essence of India with remarkable sensitivity and understanding. His photographs reflect deep empathy and an

authentic connection with his Indian subjects, transcending clichés to reveal the true soul of the country."

When Riboud returned to Kolkata in November 1971, he found a city deeply affected by the Bangladesh Liberation War. Kolkata had become a center of humanitarian aid and political activity, sheltering thousands of refugees fleeing the conflict. His photographs from this period not only document war and displacement but also reflect hope, resilience, and the unwavering spirit of the people.

A Witness to History: The 1971 Liberation War

In **December 1971**, Marc Riboud crossed into **Bangladesh with the Indian Army**, documenting the decisive moments leading to the country's independence. His images from **the refugee camps**, **the frontlines**, **and the streets of Dhaka on December 16**, **1971** are among the most valuable visual records of this historic transformation. **Few international photographers witnessed the war as closely as Riboud.**

From the **Battle of Jamalpur** to the **fall of Dhaka**, Riboud's photographs reveal the raw emotions of a people at the threshold of a new nation. His work stands alongside the finest examples of war photography—not as mere documentation, but as an artistic and humanist exploration of struggle and liberation.

Exhibition Highlights

This exhibition features **over 43 iconic photographs**, carefully selected to represent key themes from Riboud's time in Kolkata and Dhaka:

- **Kolkata as a Refuge** The humanitarian crisis, the influx of refugees, and the city's response to the war.
- Faces of Resistance Portraits of freedom fighters, civilians, and children, capturing their courage and determination.
- **Crossing into a New Nation** The historic entry into Dhaka alongside the Indian Army on December 16, 1971.
- The War and Its Aftermath The devastation left behind and the spirit of rebuilding a new Bangladesh.

These images are accompanied by archival materials, press clippings, and personal notes from Marc Riboud, offering deeper insight into his thought process and experience.

A Collaborative Effort

This exhibition is the result of a strong partnership between cultural institutions across France, India, and Bangladesh. First presented at the Liberation War Museum in 2021 then at the Alliance Française de Dhaka in October 2022, it now comes to Kolkata in collaboration with

the Kolkata Centre for Creativity, reinforcing the historical and cultural ties between these regions.

The exhibition is made possible through the support of Institut Français en Inde, highlighting the commitment of France to preserving and promoting shared histories through art and photography.
