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KCC BAITHAKKHANA: CHAPTER 2 | A BENGALI LITERARY MEET

11 April 2025, Kolkata: Kolkata Centre for Creativity (KCC) presents KCC Baithakkhana Chapter 2, an Emami CSR initiative. Curated by Chandril Bhattacharya, Sanchari Mookherjee, and Tausif Rahman, this one-of-a-kind literary meet is a three-day celebration of Bengali literature and culture through thought-provoking talks, discussions, debates, poetry, letter, and story readings, book launches, and musical performances. Scheduled from April 11th to 13th at KCC, this year's Baithakkhana delves into the depiction of the $\Box\Box\Box\Box$ (Heyro) / The Defeated in Bengali and world literature and popular media.

Following KCC Baithakkhana Chapter 1 which had "Bengali Middle Class" as its theme in 2024, this year's line-up features renowned writers such as Shirshendu Mukhopadhyay, Swapnamoy Chakraborty, and Joy Goswami; a discussion on the theatre of the vanquished by Debshankar Halder, and Chandan Sen; a debate on the Bengali tendancy of loser-worship with Somak Ghosh, Anindya Chattopadhyay, Srijato, Swati Bhattacharya, Indranil Sanyal, and Yashodhara Ray Chaudhuri; a discussion on Draupadi, the defeated empress by speakers Jaya Mitra, Swati Bhattacharya, and Semanti Ghosh; a speech by Chandril Bhattacharya; a discussion on Michael Madhusudan Dutt and Meghnad by Aveek Majumdar and Nrisingha Prasad Bhaduri; a discussion on the now extinct trio of cassettes, letters, and gentle love by Anindya Chattopadhyay, Saswati Guha Thakurta, and Tanmoy Bose; a discussion on famous box office losers by Srijit Mukherjee, Kamaleshwar Mukhopadhyay, and Jagori Bandhyopadhyay, along with multiple book launches. Performances include music by Kabir Suman; poetry and music by Srijato and Upal Sengupta, a reading of Dipendranath Bandyopadhyay's Ashwamedher Ghora by Rajatava Dutta; and letter-reading by Anirban Bhattacharya and Swastika Mukherjee.

Ms. Richa Agarwal, Chairperson, KCC, expressed her enthusiasm for the festival, stating, "What started out as a bold foray into the world of Bengali literature in 2024 is now a back for a grander second edition at KCC. With KCC Baithakkhana, we continue to unify a varied range of renowned writers, actors, musicians, filmmakers, and poets under the same roof. I believe it is essential to have interdisciplinary dialogues between art forms in a contemporary art space – which is why our festival curators have arranged a number of exciting programmes – discussions, debates, dramatic reading sessions, and musical performances – all steeped in a collective love for all things Bengali. I welcome all scholars, artists, and literature enthusiasts to convene at KCC to celebrate this beautiful language and the rich literary and cultural traditions it has given birth to."

From Draupadi to Devdas, the sufferer and the vanquished have our deepest sympathies. Bengali literature and theatre have consistently championed the defeated—the average person, the clerk, the struggling intellectual—individuals powerless against a system they cannot comprehend. In its second year, KCC Baithakkhana will celebrate the stories of the defeated through speeches, debate, discussions, songs, and performances."

Curator's Note | Theme: হৈরো (HEYRO) / THE DEFEATED

In literature and culture, heroes are often those who face defeat, and in their downfall, they become the truest embodiments of heroism. Many of us feel defeated by the intricate, often ruthless, systems of modern life. When we watch Chaplin's *Modern Times*, we laugh, but there's also a bittersweet sting in our hearts. After watching *Sholay*, the image of Jai dying while his harmonica tune echoes through the screen stays with us. Devdas, in both Bengali and Indian literature and film, remains one of the most revered figures, defeated utterly by love.

Our epics are filled with tragic figures: Karna, Draupadi, Meghnad, and Sita, whose suffering and defeat are integral to their heroism. The Mahabharata even suggests that a victory gained through murder and plunder is a true defeat. Bengali literature and theatre have consistently championed the defeated—the average person, the clerk, the struggling intellectual—individuals powerless against a system they cannot comprehend. The history of Indian sports is full of figures like P. T. Usha and Dipa Karmakar, who came so close to victory but never claimed the medal. The Bengali scientific community mourns the lack of recognition for Jagadish Chandra Bose and the tragic death of Subhas Mukhopadhyay, the creator of the world's second test-tube baby.

We may admire the victors, but our deepest sympathies lie with the vanquished. The image of Karna struggling to free his chariot wheel from the ground remains far more powerful than countless victories by Arjuna.

In this edition of KCC Baithakkhana, we celebrate the stories of the defeated. We explore the craft and magic behind how we come to identify with and empathise with the unfortunate and the doomed. We delve into different spheres of life, highlight Greek tragedies, and reflect on iconic Bengali poems, novels, and songs. We poke fun at our tear ducts, all while paying respect to the martyrs immortalised in the pages of timeless literature.
